

WRITER'S GUIDELINES:

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THE MUSEUM OF THE MOUNTAIN MAN

The Museum of the Mountain Man is in Pinedale, Wyoming, in the heart of Rocky Mountain fur trade country. Its mission is to preserve and interpret the history of the Rocky Mountain fur trade. The Green River Valley was a favorite location for

fur trappers' rendezvous in the 1830s, and accordingly many important historic events occurred here. Numerous renowned fur trade personalities passed through this area for more than three decades.

Opened in 1990, the Museum of the Mountain Man has gained a national reputation for its interpretation of one of America's legendary eras. In addition to noteworthy exhibits, the museum offers educational programs and experiential learning opportunities for all ages. Visiting scholars deliver engaging presentations and hands-on demonstrations that explore and define the history of the mountain man, Plains Indian culture, and the area's



natural history. To further its intellectual mission, the museum collaborates with eminent scholars and historians from around the country. The museum's peer-reviewed publication, the *Rocky Mountain Fur Trade Journal*, represents an annual culmination of that effort.

The museum collection includes a comprehensive and expanding fur trade library containing more than 7,000 volumes, available to scholars for in-house research. The museum is open to the public daily May 1 through September 30 and weekdays during October. The museum's staff conducts special projects and regular business year-round.
